The **Township of Muskoka Lakes** flourishes as a vibrant four-season destination, with a community defined by its rich natural landscape, welcoming spirit and 80 lakes that shape its character. With a water's edge never too far away, the summer has always sparked a natural draw to the lake inviting moments of joy and adventure.

Looking back, annual regattas have been held in many locations around the Township since the late 1800s. The program for the 1926 Port Carling Regatta identifies 24 different opportunities for participants to display their skills at swimming, canoeing, and rowing. Rather than the thrill of victory, regatta events then, and now, are focused on building friendships and strong family ties.

Another popular summer pastime is taking a boat cruise on one or more of Muskoka's lakes. From 1955 to 1958, the Sagamo and the Segwun both operated on the "big three" lakes, once offering a scenic 10hour, 100 Mile Cruise. While the Sagamo no longer travels the lakes of Muskoka, the Segwun, built in 1887, still maintains an active cruising schedule every summer and is perhaps the most identifiable icon for Muskoka tourism.

Additionally, the water has been featured prominently in promotional material for the Muskoka Lakes. One notable illustration was the cover of the 1928 brochure for Elgin House, a resort hotel on Lake Joseph, where it detailed a busy waterfront with canoeing, rowing, and touring in a fine wooden launch among the many boating activities available to guests. Though these historical vessels including Elgin House and Sagamo are no more, the same recreational opportunities such as boating, swimming, wading, hiking, and simply relaxing by the water remain available through numerous local businesses and artisans helping to bring the region's vibrant community to life, offering visitors an authentic Muskoka experience.

However you choose to spend your summer in Muskoka, I hope at least part of it is near the water. Stay safe, be respectful of those around you, and take full advantage of everything our beautiful Township has to offer.
